



Airport Express





What is it?

Limited stop express bus service from regional centers to Detroit Metropolitan Airport. Buses would travel hourly to and from the airport each day. Fares for this premium service would be higher than that of a normal bus

Where is it appropriate?

Each airport express route would pick up passengers at designated locations within Oakland, Macomb, Wayne and Washtenaw counties.





Coordination

Acting Jointly (on an informal basis)

Working together on selected functions by non-binding action.



Collaboration

Acting Jointly (on an formal basis)

Working together on selected functions by binding action (interlocal agreements, memoranda of understanding).

Consolidation

Total Integration

Merging selected (or all) functions by mutual consent and legal transfer of authority to a single legal entity.





THE SCOT ANALYSIS


It reminds you to:

- counteract threats


A SCOT analysis will be most helpful if you use it to support the vision, mission, goals, and objectives you have already defined.


